

UPDATE FROM VICAR GLEN

Pentecost is one of those days in the church's calendar where the creativity can flow. In 10th-century Rome, for example, in order to make the coming of the Holy Spirit a dramatic, dynamic event for their congregations, leaders of Pentecost services involved architecture, not just anthems.

The custom of painting heavenly scenes on the domed and vaulted ceilings of cathedrals served not only to inspire the devout with blessed visions but also disguised some discreet trap doors. During the Pentecost service, they would release live doves through these holes as diving symbols of the Holy Spirit.


At the same moment, the choirboys would break into the whooshing and drumming sound of a holy windstorm. Finally, as the doves were flying and the winds were rushing, the ceiling holes would once again be utilized -- as bushels upon bushels of rose petals were showered down upon the congregation. They called these openings to the sky in medieval churches "Holy Spirit holes."

Aside from being a dramatic and unforgettable way to celebrate the birth of the church, the idea

of 'Holy Spirit holes' is an interesting one for us to think about. We may feel there are moments in our lives when the Spirit is more apparent to us, but we also believe that God's Spirit is always with us. We are coming to the end of the 'Moving Forward Together' process and into a new season beyond Covid restrictions and the issues those have caused. The timing is serendipitous – let's see in this an opening for God's Spirit to bring the new and fresh things he wants to do amongst us at this time.

BEGONIA BEAUTY!

Nativity's neighbours living in Nativity Courts, alongside our church, are avid gardeners. Their little gardens are delightful places of tranquility, brilliant colours and rich perfumes. I visited number 5B John Street recently to enjoy a guided tour of John and Zella Viles' spectacular begonia display.

At 93, John is still working, representing Glenroy Housing, which built their home. He and Zella have always enjoyed having a large garden. Now they've settled for quality above quantity, and have amassed an astonishing collection of begonias which are literally covering entire walls of tiered plantings which they add to from a specialist nursery in Takaka.

Zella and John's two sons and their families live in Blenheim, while their daughter is in Whanganui. Keeping their begonias in peak condition takes a lot of work. With over 170 plants that flower from Christmas to the end of April, tending to flowers and watering takes a lot of time. Before winter, begonias drop their tops, and John has the task of removing dirt from every bulb and laying them in trays on shelves in the garage. Pots are cleaned out ready to be re-potted with fresh mix when pink shoots appear on the bulbs.

Zella enjoys sharing the beauty of her plants with others. "God is in everything we do here. He supplies all our needs. Looking at the glorious colours of our begonias reminds us of our awesome and wonderful God."

During the best flowering months, the Viles have a sign on their white trellis fence, inviting people to walk around their garden. "We enjoy our connection with Nativity, especially the seniors' lunches, and church people are welcome to visit and view God's beautiful creation.





WILLIAM KINGSTON - ONE OF NATIVITY'S FAITHFUL VOLUNTEERS - TURNS 50!



appreciated meeting together.


Some people found it most convenient to watch the service on their own at home, while others took advantage of the opportunity to gather with a small group of 6-8 and watch together.

THE POWER OF MORE THAN ONE

MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER

We Western humans are taught to admire the individual, the quiet, rugged person who appears immune to the pressures of everyday life to which we lesser mortals are all too subject, and who always triumphs in the end.

So we picture the hero of the Western movie, the intrepid explorer and the self-absorbed, egocentric heroes of "Top Gun", each determined to do their own thing their own way.

Certainly the world has been blessed by the work, often unseen and unlauded done by individuals, but a bigger picture suggests that when people work together even better things can happen.

God in the Creation made 'man' in His own image and, despite what some people have claimed, did not then stroke his chin and say 'Hmmm, I can do better than that', at which point He created 'woman'. Instead He observed, 'It is not good that the man should be alone'.

We are social creatures who need other people, and when we learn to work together without, as a former United States President once wrote '...anyone being concerned about who will get the credit.', then greater things can be done that exceed the total of individual efforts.

In my former trade training (I used to repair earthmoving equipment) I learned the value of what we know as 'synergy' - that is the total being greater than the sum of individual parts. As an example, take two bulldozers levelling a hill by pushing earth from the high parts to the low. Bulldozer A, capably driven, can (say) shift 25 tons of earth in an hour, while another bulldozer working nearby can also shift 25 tons of earth per hour. If, however, the drivers of the two machines resolve to work together by driving alongside one another so that their respective blades are almost touching, the two machines can then move considerably more than the combined 50 tons per hour.

Well might we apply this principle to our church. So often people weigh up whether or not they will attemd by what they get out of the experience when, more pertinently, this consideration should also include what they can put into it. In other words, a church congregation is not so much a bunch of individuals under the same roof, as it is a group worshipping and working together, both for the encouragement and benefit of one another but, more pertinently, working for the good of the community living around that congregation. Food for thought?

This week end 13-15th May, Chris Donaldson came up from Christchurch to run a training for Rest Home Chaplains and others interested in elder visiting. There were 12 trainees, two from Nativity, Pam Rentoul and Carole Brimble as well as other qualified chaplains coming to be refreshed and support Chris. Rest home chaplaincy is a vital ministry for the elderly and its heartening to know God is calling so many caring people to spend time visiting the residents of Blenheim and Picton Homes.

TAKE MY LIFE AND LET IT BE CONSECRATED LORD, TO THEE

By singing this beloved old hymn, we are offering ourselves completely to God and trusting Him to enable us to do His will, in His way, and in His perfect time. It is the prayer of one caring couple who have worshipped at Nativity Church in Blenheim for 71 years, and continue planting seeds of the Gospel there.

Rex Guard turned 90 in August; his busy, talented wife Eileen is 84. They were married at Nativity in 1958 and their three daughters were christened there. While the girls were young, both Rex and Eileen taught Sunday School. Eileen moved on to teaching teens in the Bible Class, while Rex helped out with babysitting the littlies! When Eileen was asked for the third time to join the church choir, she did; and knows God is no one's debtor. At choir, she met a life-long friend and mentor, and found a ministry in music that has kept her busy for 59 years in the church choir. "When we say 'Yes' to God's call, He gives us much more than we could ever imagine!" she explained.

TAKE MY VOICE AND LET ME SING EVER, ONLY FOR MY KING

Eileen took over the Junior choir for a decade, during which there was an anthem to learn and sing every Sunday; and ten different musical pageants to present, one each Christmas.

While raising her girls, Eileen longed for fellowship and the friendship of other young mothers. She observed families bringing babies for Baptism, then falling away from church as there was no follow-up. When her children were into school life, Eileen felt a nudge from God; and with a small group of praying women, she asked her vicar Mark Chamberlain to give her the addresses of all recently baptised infants. Boldly, she went door-knocking to invite mothers and infants to a weekly morning tea. Meanwhile, the praying women had collected toys and baked for the mothers. Only five young mums turned up for the first morning, but the seed was sown and word spread. Some mothers enjoyed a coffee and chat, others went shopping or had time to do other things while Nativity's ladies cared for their toddlers. Rev Mark then invited those mothers to share the scriptures. The Mums and Tots outreach has continued to grow; (now numbering about 100 children, plus eight volunteer carers) attending every Nativity Tunes for Tots morning.

TAKE MY HANDS AND LET THEM MOVE AT THE IMPULSE OF THY LOVE



Rex served several years as Peoples' Warden, and then as Vicar's Warden. During that time, the Diocese decided to split Nativity's congregation in two. All those living south of Muller Road were included in the new stand-alone congregation formed at St Christopher's Church, which took over an existing building. Rex recalls many hours of planning with stalwarts of the organisation of that division; Dr Bruce, Rev David Pickering and Rev Gary Darlington.

The latter two reverend gentlemen also organised a Bishopdale course of study in Blenheim, and Eileen enjoyed both the study and social interaction over four years. They did written assignments during the week and gathered together for Saturday discussions. On completion of their course, their diplomas were presented by a visiting archbishop from the UK.


TAKE MY INTELLECT AND USE EVERY GIFT AS THOU WILT CHOOSE

After Rex's time served as church warden, he was a Synod representative, and Eileen began a Bible study group. The Vicar, Mark Chamberlain trained volunteer leaders for similar groups and so began the network of Care Cells which are still so much part of Nativity's ministry. Eileen still enjoys the warmth of a caring and sharing cell group. I asked Eileen what lessons she and Rex have learned over their lifetimes of service. Here is her answer:

- When God calls us to His service, He will always provide what we need He enables us.
- However much one might do in any leadership role, KNOW that there will always be someone who can do it better. Humility is required but we also learn from our mistakes, and from others.
- Prayer before making decisions is a prerequisite!
- Prayer while in any service is a necessity. Prayer for others we work with is a privilege.
- Know your own 'Use By' date, and then move on.
- As we pray 'Lord here I am, send me', God sometimes calls us to service that is so challenging, we know we
 can only obey in His strength. We can't say 'no.'

The Presence of God, the Passion for God, and the Purity of God to Christians.

God's Presence. The Holy Spirit is God indwelling the hearts of His people (Romans 8 v 9) In the Old Testament, the Lord showed His presence to the Israelites by filling the tabernacle with fire (Numbers 9 v 14). This provided them with both light and guidance. In the New Testament, God's people were guided and comforted by the Holy Spirit dwelling in them as 'temples of the living God' (2 Cor 5 v 1).



Our Passion for God is flamed by the Holy Spirit. The timid and confused apostles, after Jesus' Crucifixion, became passionate ambassadors for the Lord when the Holy Spirit came upon them at Pentecost. Their anointing compelled them to speak the Word boldly (Acts $4 \ v \ 31$) This same power is available for Christians today who are indwelt and powered by the Holy Spirit to evangelise and proclaim the good news ($2 \ Tim \ 4, v \ 5.$)

The Holy Spirit produces purity in God's people, which is God's purpose for His church. (Titus 2 v 14). Just as a silversmith would use fire to purge the dross from precious metal, so the Lord uses the Holy Spirit to sanctify, refine and cleanse Christians from indwelling sin. (Psalm 66 v 10). He works during our times of adversity when we know that God is purifying us and growing us in grace through trials and challenges.

The Day of Pentecost


All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Acts 2:4 (NIV)

Based on Acts 2:1-21




