Although it is sad not being able to meet for worship in the church, small group gatherings are not only valid but are a potentially positive way of being the church during this time. Along with the practical considerations of protecting those most at risk and doing that in a unified way, this model allows us to continue to engage in prayer, the scriptures, and faith-sharing, albeit in a different mode. God is present as we continue to gather in this way so let's be open to what he might do among us during this season.

In this service there are questions following the sermon which can be used to guide or support discussion. The service ends with an encouragement to consider as a group what local needs you see that you could help with. While the basic structure of a service is here, don't feel you have to use every part of the service feel free to supplement parts as you feel comfortable and craft the service to be suitable to those who are attending.

- Who am I going to tell?




