One week before we were to depart my husband, Malcolm, was admitted to hospital. It was obviously not going to be a brief stay so we immediately looked for someone to take my place at short notice. Fortunately Jess's mother, Bridget, was available.

Jess, who is the director of Momentum Dance Studio at the Stadium, had offered to share dance with the children and women of Aworor. She shared her vision with her pupils and their parents at Momentum and they enthusiastically 'got on board'. They contributed gold coin donations towards the purchase of stationery for the Aworor village school. One of the pupils even suggested developing a pen-pal relationship with the school children.

Both the dance and the pen-pals were a huge success. Jess also met with the women on my behalf and worked through the programme we had planned....worship, poi making and dance, and enjoying a Maori stick game.

Jess presented letters of greeting and donations (of \$2000.00 each) from Nativity Church and friends, to the school and to St. Luke's Church. Anglican Priest, Father Bill, replied with greetings and thanks to Nativity Church. Both groups plan to spend the money on building renovations.

Mr. Donald, the Principal of the school said in a letter of thanks...... "We are very grateful about the gifts you have given us. We would like to ask you to convey our words of thanks to our Christian friends and families who have contributed in one way or another to this big amount of money, especially our Christian friends of Nativity Church in Blenheim. In addition the children of the school have really enjoyed the activities ....especially the dancing and making friends with the students from New Zealand. May our Mighty God bless you all."

The church and community of Aworor were indeed encouraged by this **2017 Mission of Encouragement** to their village.

Coming out from our Month of Mission Questions to ask ourselves posed by Jonathan Wasley: Who are we? What are we called to be? How can we be a Beacon of Hope in our community and beyond?"

The current team will return home in September, to be replaced by more Vanuatu nationals in November.

We welcome our Pacific Island friends into our parish. Their harmonious singing lifts our worship to greater heights These people are missing home and family (and tropical weather!) Please befriend them and help ease their lonely time away from home as they work hard to support their families.

Another feature of this issue of Nativity News is highlighting the efforts our mature parishioners. They make a unique contribution to our parish life, bringing their wisdom of hard-earned experience, and generosity, to bless us. Whatever our age and stage of development, we should all be abiding in God, budding, growing and developing fruits for His kingdom.

The Liaison group of Nicci Leitch, Roz Mundy, John Briggs and myself picked up the work of the Restoration Task Group that lead Parish discussion. With Stephen Sheat, we met with Architect, Alec Bruce (son of former parishioner Dr Bruce). He's generously offered to present a Feasibility Plan by the end of October. Because of his respect for this community and what we are doing he wants to do this initial work at no charge to us.


Like the rebuild of the coastal transport route we have much to do in many areas. We are not finished yet.

There is a cost, both to reach out to someone who is unknown to us or to someone who is different to us. It will cost to strengthen our buildings physically as well as making them fit for purpose into the future. We are well on the way.

#### ALISON BRICE - NATIVITY'S CHAPLAIN TO THE ELDERLY

Reflecting on my life I find God has been preparing me for this role since before I was born. It was uncanny that Bob said the same thing in his message today and that Moses was 80 when he began his work.

In the mid 1980's Reverend Pat Robbins started church services for elderly people in the geriatric ward at Wairau hospital. **Eileen Chowdhury, Shirley Woods and Vera Baskerville** helped her and as they were part of my cell group I helped in school holidays and if the service was at 4.00pm. Other

denominations then wanted to take services as well so through the Ministers Association a yearly roster was drawn up. More rest homes were built and with this growth and the decline in Rev Pat's health we were all persuaded into taking and leading services. I still remember the trepidation I felt at preparing the talk, and taking the service. Today I am still taking Rest Home services as part of my job and am most grateful for the willing helpers I have. **Robin Robb** now reminds us when and where the service is. Robin

and **Grace Petrie** take care of Aberleigh and Maxwell Care and I look after Waterlea, and Springlands and **Rev Miriam Taylor** has Ashwood Park. **Miriam Mc Namara, Trish Horrey, Toshiko Collinson** also assist at services and visiting. Later, Waterlea and Ashwood Park asked us to include a service in their dementia wings. What a blessing it is to hear these folk singing the time old songs of their Sunday School days and joining in The Lord's Prayer and Grace. Today we have parishioners who regularly come and help with supporting, singing and handing out song sheets. **Peter Sangwine** plays the piano and **Nita Harris** the violin.

One day while walking along the corridor of Ashwood Park I looked into open rooms and saw these old people just sitting or sleeping. That night God put it on my heart that I should visit and be a contact for Him, to talk to and pray with those who wanted me to. While talking to a lady at Waterlea she said that they didn't have Anglican services there. I looked up the roster and found that we only had four services a year. Again God gave me the idea of taking a care cell with communion. I now take a monthly Care cell at Waterlea with the help of **Sue Gosling**, at Springlands Life style with **Jocelyn Wilkes, Elaine Hadfield** 

and Gloria Ryan and the one at Ashwood Park has just gone into recess but with Shirley Dean and Vivienne James we have started more visiting and prayer with individuals.

Another initiative that came about through prayer was an afternoon of board games for people wanting fun and fellowship. We call it **Link** and I still coordinate it on a **Friday** afternoon in the lounge from 1.00pm.





With the appointment of **Raewyn Parkes as Parish Nurse** we have developed a great pastoral relationship with Raewyn working in the community and me in the rest homes. At times the privacy law has hindered us knowing who needs us but we are grateful to friends and families who inform us directly or through the office. This is a most rewarding ministry, a growing ministry and can always have more helpers. *Alison Brice*

#### MEET ROBYN AND ANDY PETRIE-CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Hi, we are Andy and Robyn Petrie. We have three children; Anne 14, Tim 12, and Luke, 9.

We came to Blenheim almost nine years ago. Andy started helping out in children's ministry about eight years ago and Robyn about five years ago. Why? Because it's FUN! The children of Nativity are a delight and joy to be with and **we get** 

to express our faith in many different and creative ways. For, children's ministry is not just reading and knowing Bible stories, but also exploring our spiritual gifts and being part of a group that supports and encourages each other.

I am continually challenged by how we could be doing children's ministry better. At the 2016 Scripture Union conference, we considered the four different ways children (and ourselves) meet with God: Through His Word, through serving others, through symbols and quietness (particularly difficult in children's ministry!) and through creativity. So I try to use a variety of ways in sharing my message on Sunday mornings to enable children to connect with God in their own way.





Scripture Union research also tells us **one key to children in church becoming adults active in church, is spending time in church.** I think this is an important challenge to us as a church. What does this mean and look like for Nativity? How do we encourage a more inter-generational church? All questions to consider as we grow as a church.

Please keep Nativity Kids in your prayers. Give thanks for the wonderful children we have attending Nativity; that they will grow in their love and understanding of God and their love and care for each other Pray for us and the other leaders at Nativity Kids, that we will be guided and sustained by God and our love of Him in however the future looks for children's ministry at Nativity

#### DEEP CHURCH.... TAIZE STYLE....IN SAINT BARNABAS CHAPEL



On 16<sup>th</sup> July the Deep Church (Taize style) service held in St Barnabas Chapel was a quiet and peaceful way to spend time with God, reflecting on His call to all of us to be his missionaries.

For those who haven't attended one of these 'Deep Church' times it's difficult to explain exactly what form the service will take. For a start, it isn't really a 'service'. There's no sermon, no form of service, no communal prayer, no hymns – it is based lightly on the Taize style of worship that originated in France and includes a style of monastic chants, Scripture readings, sometimes

guided contemplation, and periods of silence. The Taize description of silence is taken from the Hebrew text for Psalm 65 which says "Silence is praise to you, O God". When words and thought come to an end, God is praised in silent wonder and admiration.

The candle light, and soft chants created a beautiful place to simply still our minds and 'be'.

As one of the people who attended said "I love just being there, and spending quiet time with Jesus".




